Amusement Parks.


Our display currently in City Hall has a selection from our library of some of the material we have on our early history.

INTERESTING EXCERPTS FROM WARWICK TOWN RECORDS BOOK II 1713-1779

8-14-1722	Any dog taken $\mbox{\ensuremath{\%}}$ mile from his master shall be killed and the owner made liable for any damages caused.
3-6-1722/3	Voted 3 freemen be allowed out of town in order to build a school house at Cowessett Forge.
12-7-1724	Any time a ram was found running beyond his own yard and beyond one mile from the pound said ram shall be kept in the pound until the owner paid a fine—otherwise the ram would be slaughtered.
7-1724	Voted to build a school in Pawtuxet.
9-1731	Voted to build a highway in town from Apponaug to the Fulling Mill Voted to divide the town into six parts.
1734	Voted to build two bridges in Apponaug over the Apponaug Brook and the Kikamuit Brook
11-1734	Voted for the repeal of a bounty on fox and wildcat.
1736	Voted to build a school house at the Fulling Mill.
4-1738	Voted to pay for the burial of an Indian woman.
1739	Voted to extend the road from the Fulling Mill westward.
1741	Voted to build a bridge over the south bank of the Pawtuxet River.
1742	Voted monies paid to Thomas Wickes, jailor for transporting Benjamin Holden to gaol.
8-30-1742	Ordered the building of stocks and whipping posts. David Greene gave accounting of building the town pound in Cowesett. Bounty paid for killing squirrels.
1745	Squirrel bounty repealed.
4-1746	James Lippitt paid for purchase of Colony Law Book.
1747	William Tibbitts paid for the keeping of an Indian child.
1748	Bounty paid for foxes. (see 1734-fox bounty repealed?)
1749	Nathan Pearce paid for his care and trouble for taking care of "Indian Squaw" Hannah and her child.
