


AIRPORT HISTORY

In October 1932 the Providence Magazine announced that since August 6th of that year passengers could leave Providence [Warwick] on American Airways at noon and be in Chicago by 9:30 pm!! Passenger service was also available to Washington, DC with a stopover and plane change in Newark, NJ, and the roundtrip fare from Providence to New York was \$32. It also stated that 1000 passengers had flown out of the airport during that same time period.

Did you also know that Pothier Airfield in Buttonwoods was once considered as a location for Rhode Island's Airport? Charles Lindburgh came to town and viewed the locations in Hillsgrove, Buttonwoods and Spring Green Farm in order to give his opinion as to the suitability of the various locations for our new airport.



Rhodes Brothers Acquire Land in Cranston and Warwick

Rhodes brothers of the Rhodes Brothers' Company, the incorporated name of Rhodes-In-The- Pawtuxet, have purchased the city property at Pawtuxet, consisting of 506,247 square feet of land on the Cranston side of the Pawtuxet River, and 17,400 square feet on the Warwick side, The property comprises the dam and water privileges with the land on which four stores are located on Broad Street on the Cranston side, and the building occupied as a blacksmith shop, as well as another used as a livery stable on Main Street [Broad St.] on the Warwick side of the river.

The property is located on the right hand side of Broad and Main Streets directly abutting on the Pawtuxet Bridge on the Cranston and Warwick sides of the river.

The deeds have not yet been passed but the purchase was completed last week. The sale being consummated on the part of the city by Commissioner of Public Works Robert E. Smith. The city purchased the property in 1879 for \$50,000. The property is now taxed for \$20,000; of this amount \$13,000 is on that portion in the4 town of Cranston and \$7000 on the land on the Warwick side.

The land abuts on the Pawtuxet River continuing around the sweep of the river until it almost reaches the limits of the property now known as Rhodes-On-Pawtuxet. The portion of the property just purchased comprises one of the most beautiful sections of the Pawtuxet River. The property includes about half of the business section of Pawtuxet.

The property has been on the market for a long time, and is considered a bargain at the price. It came into the possession of the city through purchase from the American Wood Paper Company, Dec 8, 1876, and cost the city &50,000. The purchase was made at that time primarily to secure the water privilege and the dam at the mouth of the Pawtuxet, to insure an adequate water supply for the city water department. The necessity for holding the land and the dam has long since passed.

The dam, built for use in the water power of the old cotton mill that for many years stood there, forming one of the principal industries; the only mechanical industry, in fact, of the village of Pawtuxet, became of no use to the city, although its retention has had an important effect on the business of Rhodes. Brothers and Rhodes-On-the- Pawtuxet. For many years the Rhodes Brothers, and in the years previous the late Thomas H. Rhodes, who started the boating business at Rhodes-On-The Pawtuxet, has maintained the dam by keeping it in repair. By this purchase they have secured it and have thus assured a height of water in the river great enough for canoeing and boating at all times.
