

ANOTHER LOST CEMETERY FOUND?

Our colleague and diligent researcher Mark Brown is currently working on confirming the location of lost lot A10 in Oakland Beach. According to Sterling "James Arnold visited this lot 24 June 1891, 'on the West Side of Old Warwick Cove and on the north side of a small creek are three graves and a small one without protection of whom we are told are Greenes, have markers of only rude stones'."
